If your tree runs dry, the base seals with sap, making it impossible to absorb water again. Be vigilant about keeping the water topped up—especially in those crucial first two days—and your tree will stay jolly and lively.

3. Ho, Ho, Hold the Air Conditioning!

Your tree might not enjoy the holiday chill as much as you do. While it's best to avoid hot rooms, air conditioning can dry out its needles and sap its Christmas spirit even faster! Keep your tree out of the direct flow of air conditioners, and try to rely on natural ventilation whenever possible. A cozy, well-ventilated spot is your tree's winter wonderland!

4. Give Your Tree a Fresh Start – Trim the Base!

A fresh-cut Christmas tree is like a happy elf—it works best with a clean start! If your tree has been out of water for more than 30 minutes, slice a thin sliver off the bottom to remove any sap buildup and allow it to drink again. When shopping for your tree, check how it's being cared for. Steer clear of places where trees are lying on their sides, left out of water, or basking in the sun.
